Surprise Shower for Baby Girl Testament to Our Giving Spirit

It was Friday, April 16, 2021. Sarah Cook of San Clemente had given birth to a baby girl, Sunday, at MemorialCare Saddleback Medical Center two days prior. She had no idea something special was about to happen.

Returning to her room, she suddenly heard, "Surprise!" and saw balloons, cake, gifts, her husband Kevin, their two boys, her parents, and about 20 Saddleback Medical Center nurses.

Sarah was overwhelmed with emotion.

"I couldn't believe it," Sarah said.
"Nurses came in on their day off. I was so honored by all the love for our family and baby girl."

The Labor, Delivery, Recovery & Postpartum (LDRP) nurses knew that Sarah hadn't bought a single item for her baby girl. Many of them had cared for Sarah back in 2019, when, at 39 weeks pregnant, the unthinkable happened.

Unexpected tragedy

Sarah had come to Saddleback ready to deliver her third boy. Shockingly, doctors discovered the baby's heart rate was alarmingly low, so an emergency C-section was ordered. In surgery, doctors discovered Sarah's

Expert NICU Care Inspires Estate Gift

New babies give great cause for joy and celebration. For Nina and Sanjay Grover, M.D., it was no different. In 2002, they were thrilled when daughter Karina was born at Saddleback Medical Center (SMC). They were also touched by the exceptional care Karina, a preemie, received in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

"The staff was so amazing," said Nina. "Karina received such nurturing care. Every staff member, from admitting to nurses to doctors, gave us so much personal attention. We are extremely grateful."

Saddleback has a Level III NICU, meaning neonatologists, specialized nurses, respiratory therapists and equipment for intensive infant care are available around the clock.

Nina and her husband decided to show their appreciation for the care they received by paying it forward — they included SMC in their estate plans, designating the gift to the NICU. Philanthropic gifts have enabled the hospital to purchase equipment like the NicView, which allows moms to see their baby from their smartphones when they can't be at bedside.

"We're excited that our gift will help continue this level of care for future families to have a great experience at Saddleback like we did," said Nina.

In 2007, the Grover family returned to SMC for the delivery of their twin boys Dillan and Davin, who were also preemies cared for in the NICU.

Retired Nurses Pay It Forward To Boost Education, Patient Care

When Carol Hadley was ready to retire in 2013 from a long nursing career, including 15 years at Saddleback Medical Center, she knew that she would miss the people.

As a manager, she had attended the Foundation's Scholarship Awards Ceremony and was touched by those who donated. She discussed creating a scholarship for nurses, funded by nurses, with colleagues Connie Beaman, Marcie Smith and Carleen Fellows.

"All of them immediately thought it was a great idea," said Carol.

Marcie, who had been a previous scholarship recipient from the Foundation, said her award helped lighten the financial burden of earning her nurse practitioner degree, inspiring her to give back.

The nurses set up the Nurses4Nurses award through the Foundation, stipulating that the recipient be a nurse working toward a bachelor's, master's or doctorate degree. A greater percentage of nurses with

these degrees is vital for Saddleback Medical Center to maintain Magnet status, the highest recognition of nursing excellence, held by only 9 percent of hospitals in the United States.

Magnet recognition, which Saddleback Medical Center earned in 2018, has been shown to have a direct link to better clinical outcomes and increased patient satisfaction.

The group of donors contributing to the Nurses4Nurses scholarship has expanded; in total they have awarded more than \$26,000 through the years. This year alone, the entire scholarship program will award 17 scholarships to employees, totaling \$32,000.

Most importantly, this group of retired nurses found a way to impact a special place where they devoted so much of their careers.

placenta had separated from the inner wall. This can decrease or block the baby's supply of oxygen and nutrients and cause heavy bleeding in the mother. Sarah had to receive 20 blood transfusions, and baby Fisher was delivered and rushed to the NICU. Ultimately, the trauma was too great, and Fisher would take his last breath the next day, in his parents' arms.

Compassion amidst grief

Within the sadness and despair, Sarah recalls that, in the darkest moments, she felt so much compassion and calm from the Saddleback staff

"I truly believe the doctors and nurses saved my life," she said. "They also grieved and cared for us in a way that truly felt like family."

Sixteen months later, Sarah became pregnant again. Naturally, they worried about a similar outcome, so she was monitored closely as high-risk.

Eight months pregnant, Sarah was back at Saddleback, the first time since their devastating loss. She was having contractions, and doctors decided to keep her on bedrest. During that time, she saw many nurses who had cared for her and Fisher two years earlier.

Comfort through familiarity

"To be with the same people when I was back to deliver again was so therapeutic," Sarah said. "They had shared the painful moments with us. They cared so much about us. Every staff member went above and beyond their normal duties to ensure our well-being and comfort."

Sunday Lynn Cook was safely delivered on April 14, 2021. The nurses were already planning the surprise shower. "Most of the clothes she wears today are gifts from the nurses," she said.

After 12 days in the NICU, baby Sunday went home on a Sunday. Wrapped in a snuggly blanket covered in fish in honor of their angel Fisher, she ushered in a new era of joy for the Cook Family.
